The trumpeting calls of channel-billed cuckoos and koels have heralded the start of spring, along with some welcome rain to water in the new seedlings sprouting across the GER corridor.

Community volunteers help plant thousands of food trees for koalas and other wildlife in Bargo

Our partner Greater Sydney Landcare and community volunteers helped plant around 3,000 seedlings at the Australian Wildlife Sanctuary on 25 September to support local wildlife and regenerate catchment lands as part of GER's partnership with Amazon Web Services. The heritage-listed wildlife sanctuary in Bargo was badly hit by the 2019-20 Black Summer bushfires, which destroyed a significant amount of bushland on the property. The native seedlings were planted to restore and reconnect habitat for local wildlife, while also providing an important source of food for the sanctuary's resident animals.

New decision support tool a game changer for wildlife corridor projects

GER and Gondwana Link have engaged researchers at Griffith University to develop a new cutting-edge decision support tool to help practitioners plan projects to strengthen vital connections between wildlife habitats. The research was done as part of our three year joint project funded by The Ian Potter Foundation. An interactive map enables users to explore important movement corridors and patches of habitat for a selection of forest-dependent animals in eastern and south-western Australia. These include glossy black-cockatoos, gliding possums and fruit-eating pigeons. The data can be downloaded by practitioners for free and used for further analyses.

Nymboida wildlife get new state-of-the-art homes

Masked owls, brush-tailed phascogales, squirrel gliders and other animals in Nymboida have received new cutting-edge residences as part of GER's project with WIRES. State-of-the-art Habitat Modular Nest Boxes and biodegradable Habitat Pods were installed by our regional partner Clarence Landcare to provide local wildlife with additional homes after a fire ripped through the region in October last year – a place still recovering from the Black Summer bushfires.

Nuggan Biodiversity Stewardship t-shirts




